The PSA was further a key role player in the establishment of the Public Service Coordinating Bargaining Council where matters affecting public servants are negotiated and concluded. Apart from these accomplishments, the PSA has been actively supporting South African communities through various interventions. Recent projects include the #SchoolSafety campaign that addresses the creation of a conducive teaching and learning environment, and the 2023 Workers' Month project. In this project thousands of solar LED lights were donated to Grade-11 and -12 learners to assist them to carry on studying, despite loadshedding.
